Please cast your votes at this point. This means placing a sum of money into my bank account!


A word of explanation...well two. 2♦ (well, the first 2♦) was either a Weak 2 in a major suit or 20-22 balanced.

Then, North-South seemed to be aware that East's bid was insufficient. South elected to accept the insufficient bid as they are entitled to do.

The rest of the bidding was natural.

Now, many of the deals I will feature in these newsletters will be real deals at the Te Aroha Bridge Club. I would normally have named the four players by now but want to retain some readership! So, you will have to resort to blackmail to find out those involved.

So, one player held 22 hcp, while others held 8, 6 and 4 hcp. Have you made your deposit yet? Good, time to reveal.... the four hands, of course!



The two hands which did the most bidding held respectively 4 and 6 hcps while the joint fewest bids was made by East, our 22 count. Of course, your money was on East..correct?

**The serious tip :** if you think you are going to open the bidding, make sure noone has bid before you. East's failure to do so caused the insufficient bid and plenty of confusion.

We must point out that 6C was absolutely unbeatable. Well bid by West... and of course, East!

**Serious observation:** this month's deal is not meant to teach you much. It does carry an important message about the aims of this newsletter and those who will read it.
