


Never Pre-empt a Pre-Empt

This means if the opposition open the bidding with say a Weak 2 opening, maybe a 3-level pre-empt, it is not a good idea to bid if you have a **weak** bid of your own. If you do bid in such a situation, your partner expects you to have an Opening Hand.

This next story tells you why.

Trust your partner! Maybe!


A couple of weeks back I had a very pleasant Friday game with Peter TJ. I picked up one rather nice hand:



Now, normally, TJ's bid is a weak bid, very few high card points and lots of hearts. No matter how strong I am, I should pass 4H, considering how weak he might be.

However, I was suspicious. The opponents were very silent. I wondered whether my partner had rather more than he showed. If he had high cards, we were very likely to make a slam. So, I decided to take a chance, nothing to lose except a reputation of bidding makeable slams. I bid 6H. What's the worst that could happen? That TJ did held the hand he showed! This game is all about blame. I have broad shoulders.


Yes, you've guessed. TJ had what he should have, basically just a string of hearts. North led a trump. I cringed as he put down 5 hearts, 4 diamonds and 3 clubs, all rubbishy cards, no ace nor king. I was doomed..well the contract was, except for one wonderful thing. He only had one spade! Wonderful as indeed was one his rather useful "black jack".



North led their trump. With trumps out of the way very quickly, I could play 4 rounds of clubs, discarding the SJ from dummy and very soon made all 13 tricks. The slam was unbeatable but an even better score when I made the overtrick.


Well bid, TJ. Next time, I will trust you.

On to the very next hand. I was blessed with an even stronger hand!



I had a flat 21 hcp hand and was about to open 2NT but not just North but my partner as well bid before me and TJ was vulnerable. I trusted him to have what he had shown, an Opening or near Opening hand with some diamonds.


No messing. I was there with 6NT, perhaps conservatively but partner might not have much more than a string of diamonds. I awaited dummy with interest and hope! The contract was destined **not** to be lay-down!



Val (North) led HJ. I won, played a diamond to dummy's DQ and Nick's ace. Nick returned a heart. I won and played lots of diamond winners and then CAK. However, Val could keep CQ and SA and I finished down 2.

Yes, I could have bid 3NT and then TJ would have put down SA and his long diamonds. Even that was not enough to guarantee slam. So, Val and Nick ended up even with us over the 2 boards. Thanks TJ, you were nearly a double hero... but a little bit extra next time, please, for your free bid.
