I have played in a few..well, more than a few tournaments and travelled the same weekend as Damien and Lisa played, to the South Canterbury Congress in Timaru. There, my team came 2nd in somewhat unusual circumstances. 16 teams took part and in the first of 5 rounds, we played strong opposition and over 12 boards lost by a massive margin, 80 imps to 0 or 0-20 vps. Not pretty! However, we won our next 4 matches well to finish 2nd. Not surprisingly, we could not catch the team which thrashed us!

\$40 per player for a day's bridge.


Bring your own lunch...refreshments before and after play.

Bad before Good..and the 5 Level is for one's opponents!

Now, if you are going to have a bad session and a good session in a tournament, do have the bad session first. You do feel much better at the end! Joy and I put that piece of advice into practice at the Auckland Club's ANZAC Day Pairs. We did not start off in much style and mustered a bit under 44% in the morning but had a good lunch as just under 68% in the afternoon pulled us up to 9th place. Guess which session this board came from.



This was not the only board during the day when Joy had difficulty deciding whether I bid at the 5-level to make or as a sacrifice. Being vulnerable, she thought I held a stronger hand, hence her 6C bid. I was very relieved when she doubled 6S!


I was kind of right to bid 5C because 4S can be made especially after the lead of CA. Meanwhile, 5C is just one down though has chances of making if West does not lead or switch to their singleton.

However, West took fright after the 6C bid and took what they thought would be a cheap sacrifice in 6S. Not so! Joy did lead CA forcing a ruff in dummy. West lost the spade finesse and Joy played a second club won by West's CK. Eventually, as South, I had more trumps than the declarer and the end result

was 5 down doubled or +1100 to the defenders.

Wisdom of Solomon

Maybe there should be a tip from the above deal about defending at the 5level! However, this month's tip comes from declaring a modest 1NT contract. A question for you. Which red suit finesse would you take as declarer after the opponents lead a club to East's ace and a second club?



All pass

As you know, your finesses always fails while everyone else's works! Not true, of course, but it seems that way.

The answer is you should take the finesse which, even if it loses, enables you to make your contract. A good declarer counts their tricks.

South has for certain 2 club tricks, 2 diamond tricks and HA. If they take the diamond finesse and that fails, they will gain only 1 more trick in that suit...and thus will still need to take the heart finesse to come to 7 tricks.

However, if they took the heart finesse and that finesse failed, they would score 2 extra heart tricks..3 hearts, DAK and CKQ. No need to take the diamond finesse.

So, guess which finesse most declarers took (not you, of course!). Both finesses failed (of course!) and most declarers failed in their contract.

Given a choice of finesses, take the one that benefits you most even if the finesse fails...or "count your winning tricks".
