



The Wisdom of Solomon




Double, double, pain and trouble...for a declarer, of course!

I am only writing this because it is the season of goodwill, goodwill to all, although I did not feel much goodwill when this deal occurred. The message is quite simple: "if you think you can beat a contract..and it is not a situation where double is for take-out or where they can run to a different contract, then double the contract, no matter how good you perceive the opposition to be. Sometimes, the defence's cards are just too good and not even a good player can escape. Double them for penalties! Don't be afraid. Watch.



Now, South had a very good hand for a 1S overcall, with at most 1 loser in the red suits and 1 in clubs. When North came to life with 2S (perhaps not the best of calls after the opposition's club bids), West could not be held back. Within 1.15 seconds of South bidding 4S, West produced the double card. The last time these two opponents had met, it was South who did the doubling and West redoubled...and they were almost right, just one down.



(hand repeated for convenience)

Here, South really wanted to redouble but he could see the joy oozing from West's lips. Maybe this guy really meant it. He did. South lost one diamond and one club trick and could not avoid 3 trump losers, down 2 or -500.

Some players are too afraid to wield the penalty double because declarer will "find a way". Sometimes they might but many juicy (that is for the defence) penalty doubles have been missed at the club and elsewhere because the declarer is perceived to be just too good. Don't be afraid!

You may draw your own conclusion as to who the declarer was...and I am sure you will be right!

Oh, I am hoping that the rule about not doubling new players will be extended to new players' partners..and that the rule will be backdated! Perhaps, Peter TJ will not agree with that request.

A Stack of Goodwill
