**The Wisdom of Solomon**



**Aces and long suits are so useful**

It is often said that aces are worth more than 4 high card points. A recent tournament deal showed why they, coupled with a long suit, can enable one to bid and make games with far less than the recommended 25 hcp.

Let's look at the North and South hands below. Both hands have 11 high card points. You are supposed to need 25 minimum for game. That is not always true.

When their partner bid only 2H as their second bid, South was showing only a minimum opening hand. They could hold as many as 14 with a long heart suit or as few as 11 (very occasionally even 10). 2H should be showing a 6+ card suit but sometimes may only have 5.

North has only 11 hcp but that is made up of two aces and a king, pretty much always 3 tricks. DA is worth so much more than say DKJ, both being 4 hcp. Although North only has 2 hearts, they have a hand worth inviting game, opposite hopefully 6+ hearts, hence 3H.



South has only 11 hcp too and having three little clubs and a singleton in their partner's spade suit are not great assets. Yet, they too have 2 aces and extra length in hearts, the length producing extra tricks. So, even though they are minimum in high card points, they should accept the invitation, 4H. Let's see why.

West will lead SQ. Declarer takes SA in dummy and plays HAK. When the queen does not fall, they have one heart loser. No worries. Lose a third round of hearts. It does not matter what West returns. Let's say SJ. South wins SK, discarding a small minor card, say a diamond. They will lose just 2 club tricks along with a trump. Game made with a combined 22 hcp.

This is because of the power of aces, first round control in each suit, and the extra trump length. Aces are probably worth more than 4 hcp. That extra trump length is also worth more than a jack. Don't underestimate trump length and the power of aces!

### **Off to The Gold Coast... for the last time!**

No doubt, I can bring you a few pictures next month from the Gold Coast Bridge Congress. There's only a small Te Aroha contingent going this time, Rochelle, Tim, Anna Kalma, Guy, Victor and yours truly...but we will enjoy ourselves ..and hopefully do well at the table too.

This is the last Gold Coast Congress as the organisers have lost the use of the wonderful Convention Centre there and there is nowhere else big enough to take the 2,500 ish players. That's a real pity.
