Martin too enjoyed our hospitality and thanks to a fine performance by his bridge partner (Tim's words, not mine!) won their way with 63%.

p.s. Sylvan and Annie played in a couple of Junior events at the National Congress including a 3rd place finish in the Junior Teams. They reaffirmed then that they will be back at Te Aroha again soon.

And saluting our own Congress successes.

Pride of place to Joy and Peter Daffurn who won the New Zealand Intermediate Pairs, scoring 64.25 and 61.93 in the two rounds. They needed every bit of those scores as the margin of victory was just 0.57%. While victory was achieved at the bridge table, it was only confirmed after they won an appeal when a director's decision rather harshly went against them and was reversed by the Appeals Committee. A nervous wait but a great celebration when the final results were confirmed.

Tim and Rochelle also had success in the Plate event of the NZ Restricted Pairs. They averaged an impressive 58.98% in the 81 board three-session final and won this event by 4.59%.

The general feeling from Te Aroha and other players that this Congress, the first at Bay Park, was a great success. It will return there at the end of September next year.

Another honour (CK) for Tim

It has happened before to our Tim that this honour and Tim have been associated with each other. Something to do with having this honour and not leading the club suit bid by Rochelle. The incident is rightly rewarded on the bridge club wall.

On Friday 9th September, Tim once more showed, or tried to show no respect for this honour. Tim's last two cards in his 4NT contract were DA and CK. We understand that Tim revoked on trick 12 by throwing the CK and in the process failing in his contract. It took the opponents to bring Tim to his senses as of course, you are not allowed to revoke on tricks 12 or 13. Order, or the correct play of the cards, was restored and Tim ended up making his contract. Hence, the photo below is entirely appropriate.

Meanwhile, Joy and Judith were equal first, Peter Daffurn 4th and Malcolm 5th in the 2022 Waikato Bays region Intermediate League event. Points are won over a series of events and are won both for performance and attendance. Congratulations.

Te Aroha members performed well in the two-night event involving Thames and Te Aroha players. Joy and I scored rather well in the Te Aroha heat and well enough at Thames to win the Gilligan Barclay Cup for 2022.

It's Not All Science

That's bidding, I mean. Sometimes, you have to take a guess, a reasonable guess, and hope you come up with the right answer.

Take the following. I held recently:

S QT62


H AK73

D-

C QT42

and was about to embark on a scientific auction to see if partner and I had a slam to bid. Anna, my partner, had opened 1S. Slam looked promising but...

my right-hand opponent intervened with 5D. Not much room for investigating now. It was a case of guessing and hope I guessed right. What would you bid with my hand?



I chanced 6S. Well, we would not have any diamond losers. It seemed Anna's honours should mainly be high spades and clubs. Hopefully, she had enough and not too many of them! She had just enough!

West led H6, very likely a singleton which meant they had at least one of the missing trumps. As you can see winning HA and playing a spade to the ace would have produced 13 tricks. Anna decided to finesse and thus lost to the SK though there were no other losers.

Opponents just should not be allowed to intervene like that, unless it was I who held all those diamonds! See you all next month.
