I just loved those chocolate eclairs, Katrina. It's OK: I restricted myself to one!


It was a fabulously friendly evening and I think, hope everyone enjoyed it. The end result...yep, I am so so grateful.



and do we talk while we eat? Certainly!


One of the novelty hands during play involved passing 3 cards to the left before bidding started. (How we would love to be able to do that to improve our bad hands on other nights!)Before I recall one particular hand, some of you may be aware of the Tuesday night Slam Cup,1 point for every successful small and 2 points for every successful grand slam bid and made. Tim has mentioned many times recently how he is in double figures for points scored while I am a little behind on 2 points...yes, just two small slams all year!

I was pretty confident I would improve my total this evening:



After the other three players had their say, I was not going to leave my spade suit unbid even if it was a bit lacking in top honours. My partner, Hannah, thought that her SAK was more than useful and raised to slam. When West led a diamond (their partner's suit), I felt pretty confident that 12 tricks were coming.

I could discard a heart on the second round of diamonds, ruff my losing heart and if clubs were 1-1 maybe just concede a spade. No way!



When I played the second diamond, West ruffed low. I could overruff and still have a trump and heart loser or discard HK but HA by West would create a second trump loser. Either way, I was down 1 and still have just the two points on the ladder! My orders from Tim are to bid and make lots of slams when in Argentina. He said that partly (mainly?) because he knows that slams bid in

Kiwi Jigsaw Champs from Te Aroha






That's pretty fast going for a 500 piece in the Individual and a 1,000 piece in the Teams event. Congratulations to Charlotte and the rest of her team.

The Wisdom of Solomon



When your partner overcalls in a major suit and you have 5-card support, bid to game quickly and let the opponents work out whether you can make it! Watch here:



South has no idea whether their side can make game in hearts but they know they have a 10-card fit. What should happen is that East leads CQ. Declarer is best to duck this and East continues a second club. North wins, draws trumps but has to lose 2 spades and a diamond for down 1.

However, East might lead DK at trick 1 or when in, West does not play DJ...and then the contract makes! You never know! (on a different day, I would explain why West should bid 1S not 1D...when weak, bid the major suit: you may only have one chance.)
