Play starts on Tuesday October 22nd local time which is almost a day later here in New Zealand. The main event for the New Zealand Seniors' team runs for 6 days, with 4 x 12 board matches per day. The top 16 countries qualify for the knock-out stage with subsidiary events for the rest.

The National Congress that was

I and others are back after a lot of bridge and a fair bit of socialising too. Our club players turned in some good results too.

Anna and I We had a couple of poor days in the NZ Pairs but we finished 4th in the Congress Pairs which enabled us to play in the NZ Pairs Plate the following day.

In the New Zealand Teams, I played with my international partner, Alan Grant. Our team qualified 14th (16 out of 58 qualified for the knock-out stages) but were narrowly beaten by a strong Chinese team in the Round of 16. Anna's team finished midway in the qualifying stage.

In the Open Swiss Pairs, Alan Grant and I finished 5th while with our Wellington teammates, we won the Congress Senior Teams.

Anna's team finished 4th in the Congress Open Teams.

Joy Joy played the whole Congress with Jena Robinson from Thames, in the Restricted Open competitions. They qualified 5th North/South in the Pairs event and then finished 6th out of 22 pairs in the final with a very respectable 52.08% average. In the Restricted Open Teams, their team finished 6th out of 26 teams.


Tim and Rochelle They qualified for NZ Restricted Pairs Plate where they finished midway in 12th position. In the Open Teams, they teamed up with

Charlotte and Tyrel, quite a challenge against the country's best. The team finished 49th out of 58 though Charlotte and Tyrel finished an extremely creditable 22nd out of 124 pairs in the datum. Tim and Rochelle finished in mid-table in the Restricted Open Swiss Pairs...see below for the Team's category win in NZ Open Teams.

Peter and Guy They finished 7th in the Restricted Open Pairs Plate with a 52.92% average. Their team had a hard time in the Open Teams qualifying but they finished 7th out of 48 pairs in the Restricted Open Swiss Pairs.

June had a late call up and played with a partner from Whangarei in the NZ Open Pairs.

Peter and Guy enjoyed this following board from the New Zealand Open Teams:



Guy's 3NT showed about 13 to 15 points. Peter had a good hand opposite, 19 hcp. 19+ 15 is not normally enough to bid to grand slam. However, Peter checked that they had all the aces and kings and left him to play 7NT.

Guy had 4 club tricks, 3 diamond tricks and 2 top spade tricks. He needed 4 tricks from the heart suit. There were 2 possibilities. Either HQJ had to be doubleton or else South had to hold both the queen and the jack.

Guy won the opening diamond lead and soon played a heart from the East hand. When South played low, Guy inserted H9 from dummy. When both defenders followed to 3 rounds of hearts, Guy had made all 13 tricks.

Only 4 other pairs (out of 58) were in grand slam and only 1 other pair bid and made grand. Strangely, their opposition failed in 7NT. 21 pairs played in a game contract. Happy memories though for Peter and Guy.



Rochelle and Tim were there to collect their under 500 combined A Point category Teams' prize in the NZ Open Teams which they won with Charlotte and Tyrel..... but look at what follows next!


We had good numbers for these lessons, 13 for each of the first three and 10 on the last night. I hope all those who came enjoyed the sessions.

The Wisdom of Solomon



Safety First.

Here's hoping I take some of that wisdom with me to Argentina next week. In the meantime, this month's tip is about playing key suits carefully, or using what are called safety plays. Let's look at the following deal:




South opened a 12-14 1NT. North showed 5 spades (2H) and then invited game with 2NT. South was maximum (14 hcp) and even though they had 3 spades, they had a very flat hand and chose to play in 3NT.

West led C4 and declarer took a successful finesse at trick 1. They had two certain heart tricks, DA and 2 club tricks. They needed 4 spade tricks to come to 9 tricks. That means one could be lost and most of the time one will have to be lost.

South could afford to lose 1 spade trick but not 2. So, they started with a spade to the king and on the second round West followed with S9. Then came the key moment.

Are you about to perform a safety play or else go down in your contract.

Play S10 from dummy. If that loses, the suit must break evenly and you make 4 spade tricks and your contract. However, today S10 wins and you then play SA and another spade to get 4 spade tricks and make your contract. (hand reprinted for convenience)



If you had played SA and not S10 on the second round, you will lose 2 spades, 2 club tricks and later a diamond trick before you can come to 9 tricks. The contract will fail.

Thus, remember your safety plays, like playing to and inserting S10 above. I hope I remember to do so in Argentina!
