
### The Te Aroha Rubber Clash

We do not play much Rubber Bridge in this country, certainly not at our clubs. Once a year, duplicate players get the opportunity to play in the National Rubber Bridge competition. Each region has a heat with the winning pairs playing off at the National Congress in November.

Matches last 30 boards and it's "shuffle and deal" each time with Rubber Bridge scoring. 12 pairs entered the Waikato Bays heat including two from our club, Rochelle and Tim and Anna Kalma and myself. Anna and I drew the short straw in having to play one extra match.

We won both our first two matches and Rochelle and Tim, who had a bye in the first round, won their first match...and that meant a semi-final clash between the two Te Aroha pairs.

This was held at the clubrooms one coldish Wednesday morning in July...and it was quite a battle. First blood to Anna and yours truly but then Rochelle and Tim fought back to virtually all square. Sometimes, it is said hand dealt hands are boring... but look at this one we dealt..no dealing machine, remember.



I was on lead and led SQ.. but neither Tim nor Rochelle had any spades. Rochelle discarded a club from Tim's hand and ruffed in her own. She drew trumps and claimed all 13 tricks. Even on a club lead, Rochelle could make 12 tricks.

After that, the tide turned again...and by the time the last board was to be played, Tim and Rochelle needed a grand slam...and more...to win. No such luck! Anna and I thus won by just over 2,000 points and will play the Waikato Bays final in early August, the winner qualifying for the National finals in Palmerston North in November.

#### A "First" for June in June!

Well, it was not just a "first" in the month of June for the player who travels the furthest to play most Tuesday nights at Te Aroha but it was the "first time ever" for her last month.


Plenty of time still to go if your name is not on the list.


Alas, I shall be absent for nearly 2 months myself. I can see Tim smiling!

To my knowledge, there have only been 2 grand slams bid and made this year. This was the more recent one in late June:



4C was of course for aces with Pat owning up to 1, SA. 5C asked for kings and despite getting a rather negative answer from his partner, Peter went for glory. 7S is a fair contact as you can discard 3 clubs on East's diamonds and then take the heart finesse to make all 13 tricks.


In 7NT, that still only gives a declarer 12 tricks. Ross led H3. Val inserted H10. Then came HA, 4 rounds of spades and 5 rounds of diamonds. With one diamond to be played, these cards remained:



Peter played the high D4 and deviously discarded C6 from dummy. Val, North, was not sure what to discard and made the unfortunate choice of CJ. Peter had 13 tricks the very hard way. Val and Ross earned two points in the Slam One competition.


Some lovely scenery....and a picture to remind Victor of home. Yes, they have cattle there too.
